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Dear Parent/Guardian,

There have recently been a small number of confirmed measles cases in West Yorkshire. Measles spreads easily and in rare cases can lead to serious illness including ear infections, pneumonia, and inflammation of the brain which require hospitalisation. On very rare occasions infection can lead to long term disability or death.

The best way to protect your child is to get them vaccinated. The MMR vaccine is safe and effective. It offers lifelong protection against measles as well as mumps and rubella. It is never too late to vaccinate your child because measles may have serious complications regardless of their age. More information about the MMR vaccine can be found here:

The NHS are offering the MMR vaccination to children who have not previously received two doses of the vaccine. This can be accessed through your GP surgery or at one of our clinics in the summer holidays.

- high fever
- sore, red, watery eyes
- coughing

- aching and feeling generally unwell
- a blotchy red brown rash, which usually appears after the initial symptoms.
